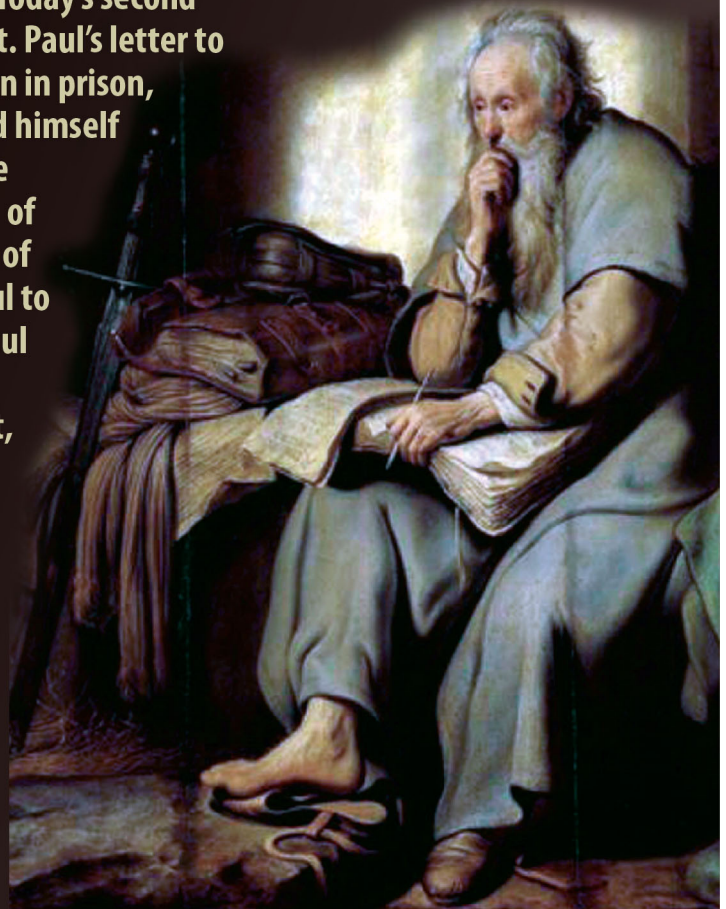

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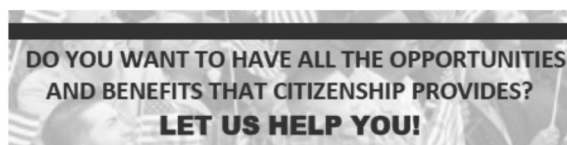

POST-SUMMER CHALLENGES

With any luck, summer delights will continue a while past last weekend's Labor Day: refreshing recreation (with maybe an occasional swim) or enjoyable relaxation on the deck (with tasty outdoor grilling). Truth is, for some of us, this year's Labor Day came way too early. With many schools back in session for a while already, mealtimes and driving schedules needed readjustment to coordinate youth sports with adult commitments. Some religious education and parish programs resumed, too. No surprise, then, that this weekend's scriptures sound a little like post-summer challenges. For instance, Wisdom reminds us that believers in God can never be content with "timid deliberations" and "unsure plans." Paul challenges longtime friend and follower Philemon to "let the good you do be voluntary." Jesus instructs "great crowds" traveling with him—including us—on three things necessary for all true disciples to accomplish. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Eastern Catholic and Orthodox Christians share a love for the Byzantine liturgy because it is during the Eucharist that the Church is most true to its identity, expresses its integrity, and discovers its vocation. Eastern Catholic and Orthodox Christians celebrate essentially the identical liturgy, with only very slight variations. It is a fairly complex ritual weaving together three separate layers of prayers: a liturgy prayed in the sanctuary by priests, often hidden by a curtain or screen; a liturgy sung by the assembly and led by a deacon in front of a screen formed of painted icons; and a third layer of private prayer by the priest, who prays in support of the deacon and the faithful. It is an eyes-wide-open experience, gorgeous in visuals, and filled with the sound of God's people singing prayer. The energy of the worship centers on the presence of Christ, largely through an awareness of heaven touching earth when the Church gathers to celebrate. In the late twentieth century, Latin Rite Catholics were encouraged to embrace a style of worship that was "full, conscious, and active," a value that has never been lost in the East. The liturgy has great impact in its beauty, in its poetry and contemplation, and by the actions of bowing, signing with the cross, and chanting that are required of the assembly. Contact with the Eastern Church reveals some key values that have been obscured in our own Church and are slowly being recovered.—James Field, Copyright J. S. Paluch Co.

SAFEGUARD THE CHILDREN

Teach your children the concept of “total body safety”

Teaching the concept of “total body safety” encompasses all parts of the body, including the head, mouth, legs and arms, which are usually overlooked. Child abuse perpetrators can use any part of the body to stimulate a child or young person, or to arouse themselves. Additionally, it is important to stress to teens the importance of “total body safety” in their relationships with others. 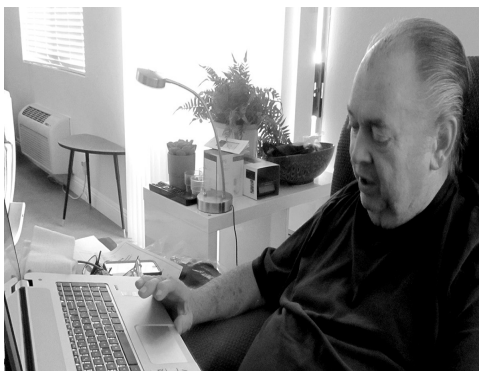

Heavenly Sound From a Humble Servant

For as long as many of us can remember, our fellow parishioner Dayne Adams has managed our church sound system. Working behind the scenes for the last thirty-five years, he has assured that the system is maintained properly and upgraded as needed to serve the needs of our worshipping community. Dayne faces some health challenges now and has decided to “retire” from this volunteer responsibility. We say thank you to this humble servant.



Dayne's roots at St. Joseph the Worker date to the mid-1980s. He and Carrie were married here in 1984, and their two daughters attended St. Joseph the Worker School. He brought his skills and experience as a film and television sound engineer to his ministry in our parish.

He learned his craft from scratch, on the job. After work as a television studio engineer in Phoenix, Arizona, he came to California. At General Dynamics/Convair in San Diego, Dayne was a television and motion picture sound engineer. He specialized in studio and remote production recording at North American Rockwell, in Downey. During his twenty-seven years at NBC, Burbank, he held positions as the cameraman in the Channel 4 helicopter, news photographer, and satellite up-link operator. Dayne brought us the O.J. Simpson low-speed chase; coverage of riots, wildfires, and other news stories; and the Northridge earthquake.

While logging long hours at NBC, Dayne dedicated himself to ministry at St. Joseph the Worker. Msgr. Jim Gehl, former pastor, recalls, “I don't know what I would have done without Dayne Adams! He spent innumerable hours of his time setting up and working on the sound system of our church. . . . I trusted him very much to make it work and to have excellent sound for all our church functions. . . .”

A church like ours presents challenges to the sound engineer. Dayne explains: “It's a big room; it's not square. Very wisely, when they designed [the church], they made [it] a trapezoid. The side walls are not at right angles to the rest of the building.” Our sound system, called a cluster, is constructed around one central point where all the speakers are mounted; the sound radiates from there. “The idea of the cluster,” Dayne says, “is to delay [the sound] so that the people who are hearing it, wherever they are in the space, have the illusion that it's acoustic sound coming straight from the speaker. That's what we try to achieve.” And it isn't easy. Former pastor Fr. Kevin Rettig remembers “occasions when Dayne spent the whole night in the sacristy fixing ‘bugs’ or installing new equipment, so that we could worship.”

To help deliver the best possible worship experience, Dayne maintained a close relationship with the Director of Music and Liturgy over the years. Former director Eileen Wandel remembers, “Like St. Joseph the Worker, Dayne demonstrated the quiet virtue of hard work, dedicating countless days and nights to meticulously set up for liturgy, especially Triduum.”

Dayne never asked to be paid. He was a humble servant who simply wanted to make things better. May God's blessing be upon him always.

La enseñanza del concepto de “seguridad de todo el cuerpo” abarca todas las partes del cuerpo, incluida la cabeza, la boca, las piernas y los brazos, que generalmente se pasan por alto. Los perpetradores de abuso infantil pueden usar cualquier parte del cuerpo para estimular a un niño o a un joven, o para excitarse ellos mismos. Además, es importante repetirles a los adolescentes la importancia de la “seguridad de todo el cuerpo” en sus relaciones con los demás. Dígalos, “Solo porque una persona es un amigo o amiga cercano/a, o incluso una novia o novio, eso no les da derecho a tocarle de una manera que te haga sentir incómodo/a”. Adopt-a-Knight Scholarship Fund
