PARISH LIFE

GIVING OF ONESELF

Scientists have recently begun to discuss the idea that the primary force behind all life in the universe is selfgift. This is how everything from galaxies to human babies are born and sustained. If we read the opening of today's passage from Isaiah correctly, we see that he anticipated twentieth-century scientists by over twenty five hundred years. Using the self-giving example of the rain and snow clouds that water the earth that then yields fruit, which in turn is given over to nourish creatures, Isaiah leads us to understand that the primary force behind all life is the word of God. The ultimate giving of that word, we believe, was Jesus Christ, who, in the greatest revelation of divine love, gave of himself on the cross. To what degree are we in touch with that selfgiving God in whose image we are made? To what extent do we really follow the self-giving example of Christ into whose death and resurrection we were baptized, whose ultimate self-gift we celebrate every week in the Eucharist? With God's help, our lives can be like Isaiah's rain and snow, and we will not return to heaven until we have done our part to make the earth fruitful. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

With the Reformation, some early Protestants, including the "Anabaptists," rejected infant baptism in favor of "believer's baptism." Against Orthodox and Catholic practice, which favored baptism as soon as possible for a newborn, these movements desired that the candidate for baptism speak for him- or herself at a mature age, not through godparents as an infant. Today, it is clear that they were rejecting a very ancient practice (even as early as the second century) of baptizing children of all ages. Children came first in ancient baptismal ceremonies, and someone would speak for them. Gregory of Nazianzen wanted to delay the baptism of children to three years of age, since at that age they could retain at least some impression of the liturgy. He made an exception for the very ill, who were to be baptized ahead of the annual Easter baptism. That means that infants and children were normally baptized together with adults, and that everyone received confirmation and the Eucharist. The tone of the early bishops' writings is generous and compassionate, and seeks to build up the Eucharistic assembly by widely celebrating the gift of the Holy Spirit. If a priest celebrated baptism, then the gift of the Spirit was postponed for the bishop, but with no regard for the person's age. So, until the fifth century, confirmation was for infants, too.-Rev. 

FROM THE FRONT COVER COMMUNITY COUNCILS PROMOTE PARISH MISSION

"... Out of our diversity we create unity through respect for every person, common celebrations, sacramental worship, Christian education of all ages, and outreach programs" (Parish Mission Statement).

The St. Joseph the Worker community is home to people from around the world. As our mission statement says, "Out of this diversity we create unity." The Hispanic, Vietnamese, and Filipino community councils (pictured on the front cover) play an important role in fulfilling this aspect of our parish mission.

Leadership: The councils analyze and prioritize the needs of their respective communities, set goals, and develop strategies for meeting them. A representative of each council serves on the Pastoral Council.

Parish Financial Support: Among the principal goals of the various communities is to support the parish financially. Toward this end, the council leadership coordinates fundraising projects (dances, dinners, food sales, raffles, etc.). The proceeds from these efforts enable the communities to make substantial donations to the parish every year.

Faith: Among the joys we experience at St. Joseph the Worker is the beauty of our common celebrations. The community councils work with the pastoral staff to create liturgies that bring to life a variety of worship traditions.

Outreach: The success of the parish Cultural Outreach Program owes much to the work of the community councils. They have organized support for a youth education program in Vietnam; a rehabilitation center in Mexicali; home construction in the Philippines; educational opportunity for children of war-torn Uganda; an elementary/secondary school in Tacna, Peru; a home for poor and displaced children of Sri Lanka; and Coptic Orphans, an organization that provides food, shelter, and educational opportunity for fatherless children in Egypt.

Service: The councils collaborate with parish leadership to coordinate each community's participation in major parish events, such as the annual Festival, the major parish fundraiser.

Information: The current council chairs are Lien Le, Vietnamese Council; Miguel Rios, Hispanic Council; Tessie Millado, Filipino Council. Each may be contacted through the Parish Center.

The core best practice rule for child safety is to have as much information as possible and replace blind trust with knowledge and healthy suspicion. That means asking questions: "Where are you going? What will you do while you are there? Who will be with you? When will you return? Which adults will be present?" Then evaluate the situation and determine if it is safe for your child to participate. And, don't be afraid to say "No." When you and your children think safety, summer is filled with fun opportunities for children to enjoy. En el año 2001, Carlos Manuel Rodríguez Santiago se convirtió en el primer laico caribeño beatificado por la Iglesia. Allí pudo obrar por el desarrollo del humanismo cristiano, la participación activa de los laicos en la liturgia de la Iglesia y por la renovación de la Vigilia Pascual. Solía decir que los cristianos "vivimos para esa noche" como cumbre y centro de nuestra fe. Carlitos es modelo para los laicos comprometidos con su fe.
